## - Key figures gallery

Congratulations on choosing History at A level! You've made an excellent choice as we study really exciting topics.

You will probably find, however, that these topics are not ones that you have come across before. That's great, as we want to expose you to as much History as possible before you get to university. We study the Making of America 1865-1975, and the Making of Britain 1951-2007.

One of the challenging things about studying History is that we need a really clear picture of the time periods we are studying in our heads, so that we can hang all of our new knowledge off that existing picture. Therefore your summer work is to start building this mental picture of America from 1865-75, and Britain from 1951-2007.

On this Powerpoint are some of the key people that you will encounter on the A level course. Your task for the summer is to begin making a **gallery of key people** for both America and Britain.

You should:

- Choose the people from each side of the course that you would like to research. You can research as many or as little as you want, but obviously the more you do the better prepared you will be!
- Create a gallery - this can either be on the computer or you can make a physical gallery in your house.
- Take a photograph of your finished gallery and bring it to the first lesson.

Below are some questions that you **could** consider when you are building your gallery:


- Can you put the key figures in chronological order?

- What events in History are they most associated with?
- Are there any connections between this person and any other person you have researched?



# Abraham Lincoln


Abraham Lincoln was president of the USA during the American Civil War.

Ulysses S Grant was the leader of the Union army during the Civil War. He later became President of the United States.




# Sitting Bull

Teddy Roosevelt was an American president.




# Booker T Washington

Betty Friedan was a feminist and author




# John F Kennedy

Winston Churchill was a British Prime Minister




# Jomo Kenyatta

Maureen Colquhoun was a Labour MP and an LGBTQ+ activist




# Shirley Williams

Rupert Murdoch is a media tycoon.




# Stephen Lawrence
